1	ARTICLE <u>510</u> ACADEMIC FREEDOM
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3	510.1 Policy. It is the policy of the University and the UFF to maintain and
4 5	encourage full academic freedom. Academic freedom and responsibility are
5 6	essential to the full development of a true university and apply to teaching,
7	research/creative activities, and assigned service. An employee engaged in such
8	activities shall be free to cultivate a spirit of inquiry and scholarly criticism and to
9	examine ideas in an atmosphere of freedom and confidence.

10	510.2 Academic Freedom. Academic freedom is the freedom to teach, both in and
12	outside the classroom, to conduct research, and to publish the results of that
13	research. Consistent with the exercise of academic responsibility, employees shall
 14	have freedom to present and discuss their own academic subjects, frankly and
15	forthrightly, without fear of censorship ;; and to <u>create and</u> select instructional <u>and</u>
16	<u>course</u> materials; and <u>to</u> determine grades in accordance with University <u>Ppolicy</u>
17	Number 4-402 Grading Policy dated December 6, 2006. ies. Objective and skillful
18	exposition of such subject matter, including the acknowledgment of a variety of
19	scholarly opinions, is the dutyexpected of every such employee. Faculty
20	Employees also are also free to address any matter of institutional policy or action.
21	As individuals, employees are free to express their opinions to the larger
22	community on any matter of social, political, economic, or other public interest,
23	without institutional discipline or restraint due to the content of those messages.
24	Unless specifically authorized by the administration, employees' opinions do not
25	reflect the policies or official positions of the University of Central Florida.
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27	510.3 Academic Responsibility. Academic freedom is accompanied by
28	corresponding responsibility on the part of employees. <u>FUniversity faculty</u> are
29	members of a learned profession. As scholars and educators, they should remember
30	that the public may judge their profession and their institution by their
31	utterancesremarks what they say and do. Accordingly, they are obliged expected
